AGENDA ITEM 7, PRESENTATION

Presentation by Executive Director Debbie Hale of the Transportation Α. Agency for Monterey County (TAMC) on the Transportation Investment Plan and Proposed 3/8% Sales Tax Measure {10 minutes}

Debbie Hale of the Transportation Agency for Monterey County (TAMC) reported that the Mayor and City Administrator have reviewed the draft Transportation Investment Plan. The plan depicts the present condition of roads with over \$1 billion of unfunded maintenance in Monterey County. The longer the wait, the more it would cost to maintain the roads. She addressed the aging population within the County, the decrease of 50% in revenues from gas tax due to the production of electric vehicles and the lower cost of gasoline. As a form of self-help, the County can implement a transportation program and decide what to do with the revenues received. This would also allow TAMC to apply for matching grant funds. The proposal is for 3/8% of a penny sales tax measure, and if approved by the voters, will be placed into a transportation fund. This would result in revenues of approximately \$20 million dollars per year. TAMC's Board prepared a plan and released for public comment a balanced transportation plan where 50% percent would be allocated towards local road repairs, and 50% towards safety and mobility needs. She explained the reasoning behind the 50/50 plan due to immediate road repair needs and regional improvements. The plan would provide Sand City an amount of \$488,000 over 30 years for street and road repairs. Ms. Hale further reported that the funds would also be allocated towards improvement at Castroville Blvd, Highway 156, an inexpensive busway for Highway 1, downtown safety and walkability funding, and safe routes to schools. The most important feature is that the State cannot take this money away.

TAMC is hoping to provide a revised plan based on the Council's input by the end of February. TAMC is hopeful that on Election Day the sales tax measure will be approved by the voters. This is a plan the County would need to assist in fixing streets and regional roads, and would be proposed for adoption by all cities in March or April this year. She encouraged the Council to review and provide input on the proposed transportation investment plan.

Council Member Kruper stated that "the Public Safety Committee (PSC) met on January 13th and the Committee decided to wait for the State to proceed with legislation AB21 before the Committee reviewed the differences between Prop 215 and the new laws signed by the Governor. As expected there is a push by the ALCU to remove local authority to regulate medical marijuana. This would give the power and the revenue to the State. The Committee looked over the ordinances for other cities, and these cities are also looking to find a balance of the rights of the Prop 215 card holders and the desire of the Council to ban all commercial medical marijuana. Tomorrow, the State Health Committee will hear AB2, this bill might strip the local governments authority to regulate patients and primary caregivers. The consensus of the PSC is to wait for the State to make clear whom the regulatory authorities will be, then review what the ordinance would do to respect all the residences of the City."

Council Member Hubler reiterated the importance of a City's right to regulate marijuana. He doesn't want to see a dispensary, cultivation, or the origination of a delivery service. He questioned the part of the ordinance that prohibits delivery to an individual that is physically unable to obtain medical cannabis, and expressed his disagreement with the language of how the ordinance was written.

Mayor Pendergrass commented on his opinion regarding the medical marijuana issue and believes that there is a price to pay if this ordinance is not approved.

Motion to approve the Second Reading of the **Ordinance** of the City of Sand City to Amend Section 18.69 of Title 18 (Zoning Ordinance) of the Sand City Municipal Code Prohibiting Medical Marijuana Dispensaries, Cultivation of Marijuana, Commercial Marijuana Deliveries, and all Commercial Medical Marijuana Activities in Sand City was made by Council Member Pendergrass, seconded by Council Member Carbone. C. Consideration of City RESOLUTION Amending the Planning Department Fee Schedule and Adopting an Application 'Reimbursement Agreement'

Associate Planner Charles Pooler commented that EMC Planning Group and City staff reviewed the Planning Departments current permit fee schedule with the intent to update the Fee Schedule to better reflect related City expenses. This includes incorporating a 'reimbursement agreement' to recoup expenses not covered by the flat rate application fee. This was presented to the Council at the October 20th Council meeting. Based on their consensus the proposed fee reorganization and increases, and the implementation of a reimbursement agreement were generally acceptable. Staff recommends approval of the draft Resolution to amend and update the Planning Department Fee Schedule and enact the Reimbursement Agreement. If approved, these will become effective sixty (60) days following its adoption.

D. Consideration of City RESOLUTION Approving Conditional Use Permit 597, Coastal Development Permit 16-01, and Site Plan 16-01 to Porsche of Monterey Authorizing a Temporary Parking Area within a Specific Segment of the Railroad Right-of-Way

Associate Planner Charles Pooler presented an application submitted by Jim Davis representing 'Porsche of Monterey' for a coastal development and conditional use permit, and site plan approval to establish a paved parking area within the railroad right-of-way. The applicant intends to use this area for additional parking to serve his business. The project involves grading, asphalt pavement, and landscaping to accommodate additional inventory, customer, and employee parking. The parking area will be approximately 40-feet deep, and 344 feet wide. Esthetic improvements will be made in order to make the entire project move forward and beneficial to the City. A conceptual landscape plan was provided illustrating New Zealand Christmas Trees and 160 perennial grasses. Irrigation will be installed. To mitigate potential blighting influences, permit conditions should prohibit storage/parking of inoperable vehicles and/or dilapidated vehicles, tires, pallets, packaging and unscreened waste receptacle bins/dumpsters. The Transportation Agency of Monterey County (TAMC) intends to eventually reinstate commuter rail service to Monterey that

would require some or all of the railway corridor width; which could then require the applicant's parking area to be removed. Staff recommends a 5-year time limit with the potential for discretionary time extensions thereafter. The extended time of 5 years (contrary to the standard 2-year time limit for railroad uses) is recommended due to the extensive level of improvements. This project is required to implement stormwater control measures (SCM), therefore a Stormwater Control Plan (SCP) is required. The project plans identify bio-filtration retention planters within the railroad right-of-way to accept stormwater runoff. This requires an Operations and Maintenance Plan (O&M Plan) and legal agreement to be recorded on the property with the Monterey County Recorder's Office regarding the long term operation and maintenance of all installed SCM's. If the project cannot demonstrate compliance, the permits should be subject to termination. Staff recommends approval of a coastal development, site plan, and conditional use permit for the project.

6:33 P.M. Floor opened for Public Comment.

The applicant Mr. Jim Davis thanked the Council, Staff and Mayor for their time and commented that following Tesla's move in date, he was approached regarding improvement to the parking lot. He has been working on a conceptual design that would work for the City. A handout containing photographs was provided to the Council of the design for the parking area. He is proposing placing drought resistant, eco-friendly plants on the west side of the tracks that will be installed and maintained.

The Mayor thanked Mr. Davis for his cooperative nature and asked if he was in agreement with the conditions of the permit. Mr. Davis responded that he was in agreement with permit conditions.

E. FIRST READING: Ordinance of the City of Sand City Adopting and Adding Chapter 6.10 to the Sand City Municipal Code requiring Proper Disposal of Pet Solid Waste

City Administrator Todd Bodem commented that there had been several complaints regarding animals defecating on public and private property. At the November 10th Public Safety Committee meeting, a discussion revolved around creating an ordinance that would involve removal of pet

solid waste. This ordinance requires that pet owners remove pet waste upon defecating, and allows for enforcement should a violation occur.

There was Council discussion regarding the possibility of placing signs around the city and where those signs would be placed. Chief Ferrante agreed that the placement of signs may be a good idea.

AGENDA ITEM 9, OLD BUSINESS

A. Progress report on Public Works projects, South of Tioga Redevelopment project, Coastal projects, and other Sand City community programs by City Engineer/Community Development Director/City Administrator

City Engineer Leon Gomez reported that water production of the desalination plant has been on hold due to high salinity at the feed water wells. Cal-Am's modeling consultant, Staff, Martin Feeney and several representatives from Cal-Am were in attendance for the meeting regarding the plant's inability to produce water.

City Administrator Todd Bodem reported that the meeting was very productive and that a list of seven action items was discussed. Derrick Williams will update the model to include the inland area near the desal plant, compile a response to Tom Luster regarding the salinity levels, and provide information relating to the Tioga wells.

City Attorney Jim Heisinger commented on the likelihood that several more wells will need to be drilled, and reported on his conversation with Rob MacLean, provided information on the current wells, and the inadequacy of the feed water and discharge line. He suggested that a discharge line may be installed that runs towards Bay Avenue. Mr. MacLean is very interested in getting the desalination plant running again.

There was Council discussion regarding salt water intrusion, and

suggestions on how to resolve the issue in relation to the permitting process and stormwater compliance.

Mr. Gomez continued to report on the stormwater permit program and conducting business inspections.

City Administrator Todd Bodem reported that Mr. Don Orosco dropped off a proposal for the purchase of the six lots at the Carroll Property.

AGENDA ITEM 10, NEW BUSINESS

A. Consideration of EMC's Proposals for a Sand City Vibrancy Plan and Zoning Code Update

City Administrator Todd Bodem commented that the item is not for approval, but rather for Council consideration for one of the two proposals provided in the agenda packet. A meeting was held with EMC Planning Group for development of a vibrancy plan. The cost for development of the plan is not in the current budget but Staff feels the plan should go back to the Budget/Personnel Committee for consideration. Council Member Blackwelder added that a vibrancy plan would give the City an opportunity to move forward and that the cost can be spread out over a period of 3-4 years.

Mayor Pendergrass suggested that the Budget/Personnel Committee take a look at the vibrancy plan to provide their recommendation. There was Council discussion regarding the possible reorganization of the Parking Committee to serve as a Technical Advisory Committee.

B. Consideration of Successor Agency RESOLUTION Approving an Administrative Budget for Fiscal Year July 2016 through June 2017

Administrative Services Director Linda Scholink presented the proposed budget for the successor agency for July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2017. Compared to the current budget, the amount allocated for staffing was reduced. There is an amount depicted for implementation of the Long Range Property Management Plan (LRPMP), and an increase of \$25,000 for Oversight Board legal services. Ms. Scholink provided clarification to Vice Mayor Carbone regarding the legal services fee increases, stating that the amounts serve as a placeholder.

The City Attorney mentioned that he will be involved with implementation of the Long Range Property Management Plan. The budget was adjusted accordingly as discussed to include a fee for Mr. Heisinger's services. There was no change in the total amount of the administrative budget.

Motion to approve the Successor Agency Resolution as amended, approving an Administrative Budget for Fiscal Year July 2016 through

Access area that reside on the lands of the State of California

Background

As a condition of approval for the Sand City Water Supply Project (SCWSP), the City of Sand City (the City) was required to construct certain improvements to provide for coastal access on Bay Avenue and Vista Del Mar. In 2010, the City constructed the Coastal Access Improvements Project (the Project). The Project consisted of street improvements, parking, drainage features, coastal access features including a beach access boardwalk and a separate beach access stairway, and landscaping. Portions of the beach access boardwalk and stairway were constructed within State Beach property and required the City to enter into a Right of Entry Permit (ROE Permit) with the State of California Department of Parks and Recreation (Parks and Recreation). The City entered into the ROE Permit on March 2, 2010, and allowed for the construction, operation, and maintenance of these improvements for a period of approximately 5-1/2 years.

Staff has identified that the ROE Permit expired on September 30, 2015. Due to the need for continued operation and maintenance of the Project, the City will need to renew and/or enter into a new ROE Permit with the State.

The City Engineer has met with the local Department of Parks and Recreation representative regarding the ROE Permit. It appears that the ROE Permit should only be issued for up to a one (1) year period. The original ROE Permit lasted 5-1/2 years, which was an oversight on the part of the Department. However, based on discussion with the Department representative, it appears the State will likely waive the fees associated with the ROE Permit, including fees for Department staff and processing of the Permit. The permit, if approved, will be valid for one (1) year. The City will then need to annually renew the ROE Permit and the term of the permit will be filled in by hand when the permit is executed.

Staff Recommendation

The City Council adopt the attached resolution authorizing and directing the City Administrator to enter into a RIGHT OF ENTRY PERMIT agreement with the State of California Department of Parks and Recreation allowing public access and the operation

and maintenance over, on and through those portions of the Project that reside on the lands of the State of California.

RIGHT OF ENTRY PERMIT

Agency: Department of Parks and Recreation

Project: City of Sand City Coastal Access Improvement Project Bay Avenue and Vista Del Mar Monterey State Beach

This Right of Entry Permit (Permit) is made and entered into this day of , between the State of California, acting by and through its Department of Parks and Recreation, hereinafter called State, and the City of Sand City, its officers, employees, agents and contractors, hereinafter called Permittee; State and Permittee may hereinafter be referred to as a Party, or collectively the Parties.

RECITALS

- Whereas, the State owns, operates and maintains the State Park known as Monterey State Beach in the City of Sand City, County of Monterey, State of California; and
- Whereas, the Permittee constructed a coastal access improvement project near the intersection of Bay Avenue and Vista Del Mar in the City of Sand City adjacent to Monterey State Beach; and
- Whereas, the Permittee's coastal access improvement project was constructed as a Coastal Commission required condition of approval for the Sand City Water Supply Project, a project to construct and operate a reverse osmosis seawater desalination facility and potable water distribution system; and
- Whereas, no portion of the desalination facility was constructed on State Beach property; and
- Whereas, the Permittee constructed a beach access platform, walkway, and separate beach access stairway within the boundaries of Monterey State Beach in order to fulfill the required Coastal Commission condition of approval; and
- Whereas, said beach improvements are subject to periodic coastal erosion and degradation requiring periodic maintenance and repair in order to provide for continued public access; and
- Whereas, the Permittee has applied to the State for permission to access that portion of Monterey State Beach near the intersection of Bay Avenue and Vista Del Mar in Sand City for purposes of continual maintenance of the beach access improvements; and
- Whereas, the State desires to accommodate Permittee's application for permission to enter
 Monterey State Beach for purposes of the Project, as provided herein and as, and to the extent, such
 Project may be ultimately described, permitted, approved and conditioned by Permittee's project
 approvals, permits, and environmental approvals, and as may be conditioned by any other regulatory
 agency having jurisdiction, if applicable.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Now therefore, the State by this Permit hereby grants to the Permittee permission to enter upon State's property, conditioned upon the agreement of the Parties that this Permit does not create or vest in Permittee any interest in the real property herein described or depicted, that the Permit is revocable and non-transferable, and that the Permit is further subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. Project Description: By this Permit, the State hereby grants to the Permittee permission to enter onto those lands depicted on the Vista Del Mar Beach Access Construction and Grading Plan dated November 2, 2009, hereby made part of this permit as "Exhibit A" (the Property), attached hereto and herein incorporated by this reference, solely for the purpose of the continued operation, maintenance, and housekeeping of these improvements. The Coastal Access Improvement Project, hereafter referred to as "Project", involved the construction of paved improvements and landscaping on Permittee's property, the construction of a beach access boardwalk and a separate beach access stairway on State Beach property.

2. Permit Subject to Laws and Regulatory Agency Permits: This Permit is expressly conditioned upon Permittee's obtaining any and all regulatory permits or approvals required by the relevant regulatory agencies for the Project and Permittee's use of the Property, and upon Permittee's compliance with all applicable municipal, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, including all State Park regulations. Permittee shall, at Permittee's sole cost and expense, comply with the Project Description, and requirements and mitigations contained in the Environmental Document.

Prior to commencement of any work, Permittee shall obtain all such legally required permits or approvals and submit to the State full and complete copies of all permits and approvals, including documentation related to or referenced in such permits and approvals, along with the corresponding agency contact and telephone numbers, and related California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and/or National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documentation as applicable.

- 3. Term of Permit: This Permit shall only be for the period beginning on , and ending on , or as may be reasonably extended by written mutual agreement of the Parties.
- 4. Consideration: Permittee agrees to pay State the sum of Zero Dollars (\$0.00) as consideration for the rights granted by this Permit. Payment is due upon execution of this Permit.
- 5. Permit Subject to Existing Claims: This Permit is subject to existing contracts, permits, licenses, encumbrances and claims which may affect the Property.
- 6. Waiver of Claims and Indemnity: Permittee waives all claims against State, its officers, agents and/or employees, for loss, injury, death or damage caused by, arising out of, or in any way connected with the condition or use of the Property, the issuance, exercise, use or implementation of this Permit, and/or the rights herein granted. Permittee further agrees to protect, save, hold harmless, indemnify and defend State, its officers, agents and/or employees from any and all loss, damage, claims, demands, costs and liability which may be suffered or incurred by State, its officers, agents and/or employees from any cause whatsoever, arising out of, or in any way connected with this Permit, exercise by Permittee of the rights herein granted, Permittee's use of the Property and/or the Project for which this Permit is granted, except those arising out of the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of State. Permittee will further cause such indemnification and waiver of claims in favor of State to be inserted in each contract that Permittee executes for the provision of services in connection with the Project for which this Permit is granted.
- 7. Contractors: Permittee shall incorporate the terms, conditions and requirements contained herein when contracting out all or any portion of the work permitted hereunder. Permittee shall be responsible for ensuring contractor/subcontractor compliance with the terms and conditions contained herein. Failure of Permittee's contractors to abide by State's terms and conditions shall constitute default by Permittee (see DEFAULT paragraph below) allowing State to terminate this Permit and seek all legal remedies.
- 8. Insurance Requirements: As a condition of this Permit and in connection with Permittee's indemnification and waiver of claims contained herein, Permittee shall maintain, and cause its contractors to maintain, a policy or policies of insurance as follows:
 - A. Commercial Permitees Permittee shall maintain motor vehicle liability with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident. Such insurance shall cover liability arising out of a motor vehicle, including all owned, hired, and non-owned motor vehicles.

Permittee shall maintain statutory Workers' Compensation and employer's liability insurance coverage in the amount of \$1,000,000/employee/disease/each accident, for all its employees who will be engaged in the performance of work on the Property, including special extensions where applicable. Said policy shall include a waiver of subrogation in favor of State. If the permittee has no employees and/or the owner(s) have elected not to be covered by workers' compensation, Permittee shall provide State with a written confirmation that Permittee is not required to be, and/or has elected not to be, covered by Workers' Compensation.

Permittee shall procure commercial general liability insurance at least as broad as the most commonly available ISO policy form CG 0001 covering premises operations, products/completed operations, personal/advertising injury and contractual liability with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 general aggregate. Said policy shall apply separately to each insured against whom any claim is made or suit is brought subject to the Permittee limits of liability.

B. Private Party Permitees
Permittee shall maintain personal auto insurance with limits of not less than \$100,000 bodily injury per person, \$300,000 bodily injury per accident, and \$50,000 property damage per accident.

Permittee shall maintain comprehensive personal liability with limits of not less than \$300,000 each occurrence.

Each policy of insurance required by this provision shall: (a) be in a form, and written by an insurer, reasonably acceptable to State; (b) be maintained at Permittee's sole expense; and (c) require at least thirty (30) days written notice to State prior to any cancellation, non-renewal or material modification of insurance coverage.

Insurance companies issuing such policies shall have a rating classification of "A-" or better and financial size category ratings of "VII" or better according to the latest edition of the A.M. Best Key Rating Guide. All Insurance companies issuing such policies shall be licensed admitted insurers or eligible surplus lines insurers authorized to do business in the State of California.

Said motor vehicle liability and commercial general liability policies shall contain an endorsement naming the CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION as an additional insured at no cost to State.

Permittee shall provide to State evidence that the insurance required to be carried by this Permit, including the endorsements affecting the additional insured status and waiver of subrogation, is in full force and effect and that premiums therefore have been paid. Such evidence shall, at State's discretion, be in either the form of an ACORD Form (Certificate of Insurance) or DPR Form 169A (Certificate of Insurance) or DPR For policy, including all endorsements.

Permittee is responsible for any deductible or self-insured retention contained within the insurance program.

Should Permittee fail to keep the specified insurance in effect at all times, Permittee shall be considered to be in default of this Permit, and State may, in addition to any other remedies it has, terminate this Permit.

Permittee shall require and ensure that all contractors and subcontractors have adequate insurance meeting the coverage requirements in this provision.

Any insurance required to be carried shall be primary and not excess to any other insurance carried by State.

Coverage shall be in force for the complete term of this Permit, including any extension thereof, and for all work being done for which this Permit is required.

- Reservation of Rights: State reserves the right to use the Property in any manner, provided such use does not unreasonably interfere with Permittee's rights herein.
- 10. Access Limits and Conditions: Access to the Property shall be limited to the access designated by the State and as depicted in Exhibit A.
- 11. Notice of Work: Any required notices to State shall be sent to the State authorities in charge of Monterey State Beach named below. 12. Limits of Work: In no event shall this Permit authorize work in excess or contrary to the terms and conditions of any regulatory agency permit or approval. Under no circumstances, whether or not

authorized by any regulatory agency, other permit or any person or entity other than State, shall work exceed that which is authorized by this Permit.

- 13. Public Safety: Permittee shall erect orange plastic temporary construction fencing and appropriate signage prior to commencement of work to prevent public access to the construction zone. Permittee shall remove such fencing within two (2) days after the completion of work. Permittee shall take, and shall cause its contractors or subcontractors to take, any and all necessary and reasonable steps to protect the public from harm in connection with the Project or implementation of this Permit.
- 14. Compliance with Monitoring and Mitigation Measures: Resource monitoring and mitigation measures, if required by the Permittee's environmental document shall be identified by the Permittee and shall be completed in accordance with and to the satisfaction of the District Superintendent or designee.

Permittee's activities conducted under this Permit shall comply with all State and Federal environmental laws, including, but not limited to, the Endangered Species Act, CEQA, and Section 5024 of the Public Resources Code.

Any of Permittee's archaeological consultants working within the boundaries of the Property shall obtain a permit from the California State Parks Archaeology, History & Museums Division prior to commencing any archaeological or cultural investigations of the Property.

Permittee shall immediately advise State's contact person if any new site conditions are found during the course of permitted work. State will advise Permittee if any new historical resources (including archaeological sites), special status species, threatened/endangered species protocols, or other resource issues are identified within the Project site. Permittee shall abide by District Superintendent or designee's instructions to protect the resource(s) during the permitted work or risk revocation of the Permit.

Permittee shall make all excavation activities on the Property available to the State Archaeologist for observation and monitoring. During excavation, the State archaeological monitor may observe and report to the State on all excavation activities. State archaeological monitor shall be empowered to stop any construction activities as necessary to protect significant cultural resources from being disturbed.

In the event that previously unknown cultural resources, including, but not limited to, dark soil containing shell, bone, flaked stone, groundstone, or deposits of historic trash are encountered during Project construction by anyone, work will be suspended at that specific location, and the Permittee's work will be redirected to other tasks, until after a State-qualified archaeologist has evaluated the find and implemented appropriate treatment measures and disposition of artifacts, as appropriate, in compliance with all applicable laws and department resource directives.

If human remains are discovered during the Project, work will be immediately suspended at that specific location and the District Superintendent or designee shall be notified by Permittee. The specific protocol, guidelines and channels of communication outlined by the California Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC), and/or contained in Health and Safety Code Section 7050.5 and Public Resources Code Sections 5097.9 et seq., will be followed. Those statutes will guide the potential Native American involvement in the event of discovery of human remains.

Permittee shall provide a written work schedule to State so that the State archaeological monitor can arrange to be on site on the necessary days. Permittee shall provide reasonable advance notice of and invite the District Superintendent or designee to any preconstruction meetings with the prime contractor or subcontractors.

- 15. Restoration of Property: Permittee shall complete the restoration, repair, and revegetation of the Property in consultation with, and to the satisfaction of, the State Environmental Scientist within one (1) year after completion of the Project or the expiration or termination of this Permit, whichever comes first. This obligation shall survive the expiration or termination of this Permit.
- 16. Performance Bond: If required by State in order to ensure that Permittee performs and completes its obligations in accordance with the terms of the Permit, Permittee shall obtain a Performance Bond in the amount of from a surety duly licensed in the State of California. Permittee shall provide State with a copy of such insurance bond.
 - 17. Right to Halt Work: The State reserves the right to halt work and demand mitigation measures at any time, with or without prior notice to Permittee, in the event the State determines that any provision contained herein has been violated, or in the event that cessation of work is necessary to

prevent, avoid, mitigate or remediate any threat to the health and safety of the public or state park personnel, or to the natural or cultural resources of the state park.

18. Use Restrictions: The use of the Property by Permittee, including its guests, invitees, employees, contractors and agents, shall be restricted to the daytime hours between sunrise and sunset on a day-by-day basis, unless otherwise approved in advance in writing by State. No person shall use or occupy the Property overnight.

Activities on the Property shall be conducted only in a manner which will not interfere with the orderly operation of the state park. Permittee shall not engage in any disorderly conduct and shall not maintain, possess, store or allow any contraband on the Property. Contraband includes, but is not limited to: any illegal alcoholic beverages, drugs, firearms, explosives and weapons.

Roads and trails where motorized vehicles are normally prohibited may be used for vehicle access by Permittee, its employees, agents or contractors for patrol, maintenance or repair purposes only, and only to the extent specified by State, and shall be otherwise subject to all other conditions and/or restrictions of this Permit and any applicable laws, state park regulations and state park policies.

Permittee shall not use or allow the Property to be used, either in whole or in part, for any purpose other than as set forth in this Permit, without the prior written consent of the State.

19. State's Right to Enter: At all times during the term of this Permit and any extension thereof, there shall be and is hereby expressly reserved to State and to any of its agencies, contractors, agents, employees, representatives, invitees or licensees, the right at any and all times, and any and all places, to temporarily enter upon said Property to survey, inspect, or perform any other lawful State purposes.

Permittee shall not interfere with State's right to enter.

- 20. Protection of Property: Permittee shall protect the Property, including all improvements and all natural and cultural features thereon, at all times at Permittee's sole cost and expense, and Permittee shall strictly adhere to the following restrictions:
 - (a) Permittee shall not place or dump garbage, trash or refuse anywhere upon or within the Property, except in self-contained trash receptacles that are maintained to State's satisfaction by Permittee.
 - (b) Permittee shall not commit or create, or suffer to be committed or created, any waste, hazardous condition or nuisance in, on, under, above or adjacent to the Property.
 - (c) Permittee shall not cut, prune or remove any vegetation upon the Property, except as identified in the Project description and herein permitted or subsequently approved in writing by the District Superintendent.
 - (d) Permittee shall not disturb, move or remove any rocks or boulders upon the Property, except as identified in the Project description and herein permitted or subsequently approved in writing by the District Superintendent.
 - (e) Permittee shall not grade or regrade, or alter in any way, the ground surface of the Property, except as herein permitted, or subsequently approved in writing by the District Superintendent.
 - (f) Permittee shall not bait, poison, trap, hunt, pursue, catch, kill or engage in any other activity which results in the taking, maiming or injury of wildlife upon the Property, except as identified in the Project description and herein permitted or subsequently approved in writing by the District Superintendent.
 - (g) Permittee shall not use, create, store, possess or dispose of hazardous substances (as defined in the California Hazardous Substances Act) on the Property except as herein permitted, or subsequently approved in writing by the District Superintendent.
 - (h) Permittee shall exercise due diligence to protect the Property against damage or destruction by fire, vandalism and any other causes.
- 21. Default: In the event of a default or breach by Permittee of any of the terms or conditions set forth in this Permit, State may at any time thereafter, without limiting State in the exercise of any right of remedy at law or in equity which State may have by reason of such default or breach:

- (a) Maintain this Permit in full force and effect and recover the consideration, if any, and other monetary charges as they become due, without terminating Permittee's right to use of the Property, regardless of whether Permittee has abandoned the Property; or
- (b) Immediately terminate this Permit upon giving written notice to Permittee, whereupon Permittee shall immediately surrender possession of the Property to State and remove all of Permittee's equipment and other personal property from the Property. In such event, State shall be entitled to recover from Permittee all damages incurred or suffered by State by reason of Permittee's default, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - (i) any amount necessary to compensate State for all the detriment proximately caused by Permittee's failure to perform its obligations under this Permit, including, but not limited to, compensation for the cost of restoration, repair and revegetation of the Property, which shall be done at State's sole discretion and compensation for the detriment which in the ordinary course of events would be likely to result from the default; plus
 - (ii) at State's election, such other amounts in addition to or in lieu of the foregoing as may be permitted from time to time by applicable law.
- 22. State's Right to Cure Permittee's Default: At any time after Permittee is in default or in material breach of this Permit, State may, but shall not be required to, cure such default or breach at Permittee's cost. If State at any time, by reason of such default or breach, pays any sum or does any act that requires the payment of any sum, the sum paid by State shall be due immediately from Permittee to State at the time the sum is paid. The sum due from Permittee to State shall bear the maximum interest allowed by California law from the date the sum was paid by State until the date on which Permittee reimburses State.
- 23. Revocation of Permit: The State shall have the absolute right to revoke this Permit for any reason upon ten (10) days written notice to Permittee. Written notice to Permittee may be accomplished by electronic or facsimile transmission, and the notice period set forth in this paragraph shall begin on the date of the electronic or facsimile transmission, or, if sent by mail, on the date of delivery. If Permittee is in breach of the Permit or owes money to the State pursuant to this Permit, any prepaid monies paid by Permittee to State shall be held and applied by the State as an offset toward damages and/or amounts owed. Nothing stated herein shall limit the State's exercise of its legal and equitable remedies.
- 24. Recovery of Legal Fees: In any action brought to enforce or interpret any provisions of this Permit or to restrain the breach of any agreement contained herein, or for the recovery of possession of the Property, or to protect any rights given to the State against Permittee, and in any actions or proceedings under Title 11 of the United States Code, if the State shall prevail in such action on trial or appeal, the Permittee shall pay to the State such amount in attorney's fees in said action as the court shall determine to be reasonable, which shall be fixed by the court as part of the costs of said action.
- 25. Voluntary Execution and Independence of Counsel: By their respective signatures below, each Party hereto affirms that they have read and understood this Permit and have received independent counsel and advice from their attorneys with respect to the advisability of executing this Permit.
- 26. Reliance on Investigations: Permittee declares that it has made such investigation of the facts pertaining to this Permit, the Property and all the matters pertaining thereto as it deems necessary, and on that basis accepts the terms and conditions contained in this Permit. Permittee acknowledges that State has made, and makes, no representations or warranties as to the condition of the Property, and Permittee expressly agrees to accept the Property in its as-is condition for use as herein permitted.
- 27. Entire Agreement: The Parties further declare and represent that no inducement, promise or agreement not herein expressed has been made to them and this Permit contains the entire agreement of the Parties, and that the terms of this agreement are contractual and not a mere recital.
- 28. Warranty of Authority: The undersigned represents that they have the authority to, and do, bind the person or entity on whose behalf and for whom they are signing this Permit and the attendant documents provided for herein, and this Permit and said additional documents are, accordingly, binding on said person or entity.
- 29. Assignment: This Permit shall not be assigned, mortgaged, hypothecated, or transferred by Permittee, whether voluntarily or involuntarily or by operation of law, nor shall Permittee let, sublet or

grant any license or permit with respect to the use and occupancy of the Property or any portion thereof, without the prior written consent of State.

30. Choice of Law: This Permit will be governed and construed by the laws of the State of California.



SUBJECT: Adoption of the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan as

required by FEMA

BACKGROUND

The United States Congress passed the Disaster Mitigation Act (DMA) of 2000, which amended the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act). This amendment repealed the previous mitigation section (Section 409) of the Stafford Act and replaced it with a new mitigation planning section (Section 322). To implement DMA 2000 planning requirements, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) established mitigation-planning requirements for states, tribes, and local communities. These mandates require local jurisdictions to prepare and adopt a Hazard Mitigation Plan.

In response, the County of Monterey and various local municipalities coordinated and pooled their resources to prepare the 2007 edition of the County of Monterey Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, which was adopted by Sand City. Participating jurisdictions were the County of Monterey and the cities of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Del Rey Oaks, Gonzales, Greenfield, King City, Marina, Monterey, Pacific Grove, Salinas, Sand City, Seaside, and Soledad. The 2007 Hazard Mitigation Plan was mandated to be updated within five (5) years of its adoption. Representatives from the participating jurisdictions collaborated throughout 2013-14 to satisfy the new federal requirements for updating this Hazard Mitigation Plan, of which a draft was sent to FEMA last year for review. FEMA just completed its review and acceptance of the updated Monterey County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan; however, final approval is pending the Plan's adoption by those participating local governments (see Exhibit A).

DISCUSSION

The 2015 updated Hazard Mitigation Plan is divided into nine sections; discussing the Planning Process, Planning Area Profile, the Hazard Analysis, Vulnerability Analysis, Capability Assessment, Mitigation Strategies, and Maintenance procedures. The updated Hazard Analysis section includes revisions to existing hazard profiles, including historical or anecdotal information for events that occurred since 2007. The updated Vulnerability Analysis utilized data from local parcel geometry and the tax assessor to replace the less reliable Hazus data utilized in the 2007 edition of the Hazard Mitigation Plan. Furthermore, discussion was added to both these sections regarding anticipated impacts due to climate change. The Capability Assessment section was added, which discusses the technical, fiscal, political, planning, regulation, and staff/administration abilities of each participating jurisdiction. Appendix D provides information regarding the public outreach program and survey conducted by the County of Monterey and AECOM Corporation (a professional service corporation). Appendices H through U provide jurisdiction specific data and discussion. Sand City is Appendix R (see Exhibit B).

Adoption and implementation of a Hazard Mitigation Plan enables Sand City to be eligible for Federal mitigation funding, as well as pre-disaster and post-disaster Federal funding. The final step at this time is adoption by the City Council of this 2015 updated edition. The Mitigation Plan is required to be updated again within five (5) years.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends **APPROVAL** of the attached resolution, adopting the 2015 Updated County of Monterey Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Executive Summary

What is Hazard Mitigation?

Monterey County is potentially vulnerable to a wide range of natural and manmade hazards. These hazards can threaten the life and safety of residents and visitors, and have the potential to damage or destroy both public and private property and disrupt the local economy and overall quality of life.

While the threats from hazard events may never be fully eliminated, there is much we can do to lessen their potential impact on our communities. By minimizing the damaging impacts of hazards upon our built environment, we can prevent such events from resulting in disasters. The concept and practice of reducing risks to people and property from known hazards is called hazard mitigation.

Hazard mitigation activities include a variety of different actions. Structural related measures include activities such as strengthening or protecting buildings and infrastructure from the destructive forces of potential hazards, or in some cases, such as flood control, physically altering the natural course of the

What is a Hazard Mitigation Plan?

One of the most effective means that a community can use to implement a comprehensive approach to hazard mitigation is to develop, adopt, and update as needed, a local hazard mitigation plan. A mitigation plan establishes the broad local vision and guiding principles for reducing hazard risk, and proposes specific mitigation actions to eliminate or reduce identified vulnerabilities.

The Monterey County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan is an effective approach to facilitate incorporation of hazard mitigation principles and practices into routine government activities and functions of the County and the 12 municipalities participating in this Plan.

Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000

In an effort to reduce the nation's mounting natural disaster losses, the U.S. Congress passed the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 to amend the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act by invoking new and revitalized approaches to hazard mitigation planning. Section 322 of the Act emphasizes the need for state and local government entities to closely coordinate on hazard mitigation planning activities, and makes the development of a hazard mitigation plan a specific eligibility requirement for any local government applying for federal mitigation grant funds. Communities with an adopted and federally-approved hazard mitigation plan are eligible to receive certain types of mitigation funds before and after future disaster declarations, and, in some ways, are "pre-positioned" or "pre-qualified" for this funding.

To implement the new Stafford Act provisions, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) published requirements and procedures for local hazard mitigation plans in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) at Title 44, Chapter 1, Part 201.6. These regulations specify minimum standards for developing, updating, and submitting local hazard mitigation plans for FEMA review and approval at least once every five years.

This Plan was prepared in coordination with FEMA and the California Office of Emergency Services (COES) to ensure that it meets all applicable federal and state requirements. This includes conformance with FEMA's latest *Local Mitigation Planning Handbook* (released March 2013) and *Local Mitigation Plan Review Guide* (released October 2011).

Purpose and Mission Statement

The general purpose of this Monterey County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan is:

- To protect life and property by reducing the potential for future damages and economic losses that result from known hazards;
- To qualify for additional grant funding, in both the pre-disaster and post-disaster environment;
- To speed recovery and redevelopment following future disaster events;
- To sustain and enhance existing governmental coordination throughout Monterey County and demonstrate a firm local commitment to hazard mitigation principles; and
- To comply with federal and state requirements for local hazard mitigation plans.

The following Mission Statement was created and agreed upon by the participants to represent the overall intended outcome of the Plan:

Protect the public health, safety, quality of life, environment, and economy of Monterey County by reducing the long-term risk of damage and loss to known hazards through coordinated planning, partnerships, capacity building, and implementation of effective risk reduction measures.

Scope and Authority

The geographic scope (i.e., the "planning area") for the Plan includes all incorporated and unincorporated areas of Monterey County. This includes Monterey County and the City of Carmelby-the-Sea, City of Del Rey Oaks, City of Gonzales, City of Greenfield, City of King City, City of Marina, City of Monterey, City of Pacific Grove, City of Salinas, City of Sand City, City of Seaside, and the City of Soledad.

The Plan addresses those hazards determined to be of primary or secondary concern to each jurisdiction, as documented in the risk assessment portion of this Plan. Other hazards that pose a low risk or are otherwise omitted from this Plan will continue to be evaluated during future plan updates, but they may not be fully addressed until they are determined to be of primary or secondary concern to Monterey County. Individual entities are still able to, and are encouraged to, continue to address and plan for those other hazards as may be appropriate within their jurisdictions.

This Plan must be adopted by all participating jurisdictions in accordance with the authority and police powers granted to local governments under Article 11 of the California Constitution.

This Plan was developed in accordance with current federal rules and regulations governing local hazard mitigation plans. The Plan shall be monitored and updated on a routine basis to maintain compliance with the following legislation:

 Section 322, Mitigation Planning, of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as enacted by Section 104 of the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (Public Law 106-390) and by FEMA's Interim Final Rule published in the Federal Register on February 26, 2002, at 44 CFR Part 201.

Therefore it is essential that projected patterns of future development are evaluated and considered in terms of how that growth will increase or decrease a community's vulnerability to hazards over time.

mitigation plan establishes the broad local vision and guiding principles for reducing hazard risk, and further proposes specific mitigation actions to eliminate or reduce identified vulnerabilities.

The Monterey County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan (hereinafter referred to as "MJHMP" or "Plan") is an effective approach to facilitate incorporation of hazard mitigation principles and practices into routine government activities and functions of the County and 12 municipalities participating in this Plan. The Plan recommends specific actions that are designed to protect people and community assets from losses to those hazards that pose the greatest risk. These mitigation actions go beyond simply recommending structural solutions to reduce existing vulnerability, such as retrofitting buildings or strengthening infrastructure. Local policies on community growth and development, incentives for natural resource protection, and public awareness and outreach activities are examples of other actions considered to reduce Monterey County's future vulnerability to identified hazards.

The Plan is designed to be a living document, with implementation and evaluation procedures included to help achieve meaningful objectives and successful outcomes over time.

Communities with an adopted and federally-approved hazard mitigation plan thereby become pre-positioned and more apt to receive available mitigation funds before and after the next declared disaster.

To implement the new Stafford Act provisions, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) published requirements and procedures for local hazard mitigation plans in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) at Title 44, Chapter 1, Part 201.6. These regulations specify minimum standards for developing, updating, and submitting local hazard mitigation plans for FEMA review and approval at least once every five years.

This Plan was prepared in coordination with FEMA and the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) to ensure that it meets all applicable federal and state requirements. This includes conformance with FEMA's latest *Local Mitigation Planning Handbook* (released March 2013) and *Local Mitigation Plan Review Guide* (released October 2011). The purpose of this assessment is to identify any existing gaps, weaknesses, or conflicts in programs or activities that may hinder mitigation efforts, and to identify those activities that should be built upon (such as participation in the National Flood Insurance Program and where relevant the Community Rating System) in establishing a successful and sustainable community hazard mitigation program. The *Planning Area Profile, Hazard Analysis, Vulnerability Analysis*, and *Capability Assessment* collectively serve as a basis for determining the goals for the MJHMP, each contributing to the development, adoption, and implementation of a meaningful *Mitigation Strategy* that is based on accurate background information.

Mitigation Strategy

Section 7 provides a blueprint for reducing the potential losses identified in the vulnerability analysis. For the countywide mitigation strategy, the Planning Team developed a list of mitigation goals and actions based upon the findings of the *Vulnerability Analysis*. Based upon these goals and other criteria, the Planning Team reviewed and prioritized a comprehensive range of appropriate mitigation actions to address the risks facing the county. Such measures include local plans and regulations, structure and infrastructure projects, natural systems protection, education and awareness programs, and other activities. Community-specific Mitigation Action Plans, including other locally specific information, are provided in Appendices H through U. For this version of the MIHMP, Special Districts (Appendix U) did not prepare individual mitigation actions.

Plan Maintenance Procedures

Coastal Erosion

The sandy dunes along the city's coastline erode at an average 2.6 feet a year. Therefore, using a 100-year projection to determine areas at risk to coastal erosion, only 2 nonresidential buildings (worth \$89,000), are located in this hazard area.

Earthquake

Nearly all of Sand City is susceptible to high earthquake shaking. This includes 261 people (100 percent of the total population), 57 residential buildings (worth \$16.5 million), 41 nonresidential buildings (worth \$89.5 million), and 2 critical facilities (worth \$6.7 million). 1.2 miles of highway and 3 bridges are located in this hazard area.

Flood

The SFHA in Sand City consists of wave attack from the Pacific Ocean. As such, only 1 nonresidential building (worth \$76,000), is located in the 100-year floodplain. Future hotel projects may be impacted.

Hazardous Materials Event

Within the 1-mile buffer around the transportation corridors, 100 percent of Sand City's population is exposed to a hazardous material transport event. This includes 261 people, 51 residential buildings (worth \$6.8 million), 156 nonresidential buildings (worth \$87.7 million), and 2 critical facilities (worth \$6.7 million). 2.3 miles of highway, 1.5 miles of railroad, and 5 bridges are located in this hazard area. These figures are for the entirety of the transportation corridors and, therefore, overstate the exposure since single a HAZMAT event at a given point along these corridors is unlikely to affect all of the area within the 1-mile buffer.

There are no hazards associated with fixed HAZMAT sites within the city.

Sea Level Rise

The potential for sea level rise is present along the entire coast of Monterey County. However, no people, buildings, critical facilities, or critical infrastructure in the City of Sand City are located in this hazard zone.

Tsunami

Using the New Tsunami Inundation Map data, only 1 nonresidential building is exposed to the tsunami hazard.

Wildland Fire

Using the California FRAP model, nearly the entire City of Sand City is located within a moderate wildland fire hazard area. Within this area are 261 people, 51 residential buildings (worth \$6.8 million), 154 nonresidential buildings (worth \$86.5 million), and 2 critical facilities (worth \$6.7 million). 1.9 miles of highway, 1.4 miles of railroad, and 5 bridges are located in this hazard area.

Problem Statements are statements of particular interest with regard to primary hazards of concern, geographic areas of concern, or vulnerable community assets. These statements were primarily derived from local community site visits and discussion with local staff and officials from each community during Individual Jurisdiction Meetings, in combination with a review of the Safety Elements of local General Plans and GIS analysis using best available data in support of updates to the vulnerability analysis for each jurisdiction. They were developed to assist in the identification and analysis of potential hazard mitigation actions for the City of Sand City.

- The city's existing drainage system is deemed inadequate for conveying stormwater during heavy rainfall events with several known problem areas. Of primary concern is the vicinity of Redwood Avenue at John Street, one of the lowest points in the city (approximately 4 feet below sea level) which has experienced past flood events that have inundated streets and nearby commercial properties. Other areas of concern include John Street at Ortiz Avenue and near the intersection of Ortiz Avenue at Contra Costa Street.
- The City of Seaside's 90" outfall at the end of Bay Avenue continues to get plugged by shifting sands, preventing drainage of stormwater runoff from Seaside and Sand City, and contributing regularly (multiple times per year) to stormwater flooding at John Street and Ortiz Avenue. Recent improvement projects have proven to be ineffective. The outfall is also considered as a potential source of seawater inflow to Sand City from major coastal flood or tsunami events. Removal and replacement/relocation of the outfall with backflow prevention device is deemed by the city to be the most appropriate long-term solution, coupled with diversion capabilities to a secondary outfall if needed.

- The city's new desalination plant and facilities are critical to be protected from future hazard events. Of primary concern is the pipeline under Highway 1/Sand Dunes Drive between Canyon Del Rey Boulevard and Tioga Avenue, which may be exposed to damages caused by future earthquake, tsunami or coastal erosion events. Along this same location is the Monterey Interceptor pipeline that carries raw sewage to the MRWPCA Regional Treatment Plant in Marina.
- Also of primary concern to the city are damages or disruptions to critical transportation facilities, including but not limited to the five bridges/overpasses that provide the only ingress and egress to the city, and the main arterial streets that provide for internal mobility.
- Several elevated storage tanks used for acid baths at Granite Rock (Dias Street) currently store an estimated 2,000+ gallons that may potentially be damaged or cause overflow/flood issues following an earthquake and local ground-shaking event.
- While the city's population is low, it becomes one of the most densely populated areas in Monterey County during the daytime due to its two regional commercial shopping centers (Sand Dollar and Edgewater), creating a major warning and evacuation concern for the City.
- Two proposed developments, Monterey Bay Shores Resort and The Collections Resort, will increase the city's population density in areas that may be at risk to future coastal hazard events.
- The Monterey Regional Water Pollution Control Agency (MRWPCA) operates a sewer pump station at West Bay Street in Sand City. This facility is located close to the shoreline, and is potentially susceptible to tsunami. Furthermore, there is a 36-inch force main that extends from this pump station north along the west side of Highway 1 to the treatment plant in the City of Marina. Both the pump station and this 36-inch force main are susceptible to earthquakes. Damage to one or both of these facilities would have far reaching impacts to the sewer service of the Monterey Peninsula community, in addition to potential spills and contamination. The pump station and pipelines are the property and jurisdiction of the MRWPCA, and thus maintenance and repair are that Agency's responsibility. However, during an emergency whereby the plant and/or infrastructure is damaged, the City of Sand City would be the immediate emergency responder for that infrastructure within Sand City's boundaries.

WHEREAS, the City of Sand City is potentially susceptible to natural and human caused hazards such as drought, flooding, severe wind, transportation accidents, wildfire, and storms, that have the potential to impose loss of property and life, economic hardship, and threats to public health and safety; and

WHEREAS, the County of Monterey and participating jurisdictions, which include the cities of Carmel-by-the-Sea, Del Rey Oaks, Gonzales, Greenfield, King City, Marina, Monterey, Pacific Grove, Salinas, Sand City, Seaside, and Soledad, coordinated their efforts in updating the Monterey County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan for 2015 in accordance with the Disaster Mitigation Act 2000; and

WHEREAS, the 2015 update to the Monterey County Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan was developed after gathering information, reviewing data, research assistance from AECOM Corporation (a professional service corporation), and input from the City of Sand City regarding its jurisdiction, in association and cooperation with the County of Monterey and the State of California Office of Emergency Services; and

Second Reading - Draft Ordinance To Establish Requirements For The

Proper Disposal Of Pet Solid Waste

Background

At the January 19, 2016 City Council meeting and public hearing, the Council took action to adopt, for first reading, an ordinance adding Chapter 6.10 to the Sand City Municipal Code requiring proper disposal of pet solid waste.

As a result of complaints about dogs defecating upon public and private property within the community, the Public Safety Committee met on November 10, 2015 to discuss the issue and concerns mentioned. At the meeting, staff was directed to develop an ordinance regarding the proper disposal of pet solid waste.

This ordinance was put forward as an important step towards protecting the public's health, safety, and welfare in minimizing the possible risk of infection due to pet feces and excrement. This would also help eliminate the volume of waste that imposes a serious visual detriment to the City.

This ordinance will make it unlawful for any person owning or having control of any pet to permit the animal to defecate upon public or private property within the City unless the person immediately removes the feces and properly disposes of it.

It shall be unlawful for any person to walk a pet on public property of this City or upon the private property of another without carrying at all times a suitable container or other suitable instrument for the removal and disposal of pet feces.

Any owner or keeper who requires the use of a service animal and is physically unable to properly dispose of that service animal's solid waste shall be exempt from this ordinance requiring proper disposal of the service animal's solid waste.

Violations are punishable in accordance with Chapter 1.16 (General Penalty) of the Sand City Municipal Code. Infractions are punishable by: 1) a fine not exceeding \$100 for the first violation 2) a fine not exceeding \$200 for a repeat violation within a year, and 3) a fine not exceeding \$500 for each subsequent violation within one year.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the City Council approve the attached Ordinance, for second reading to add Chapter 6.10 to the Sand City Municipal Code requiring proper disposal of pet solid waste. The ordinance would go into effect 30-days following its second reading (2nd public hearing).

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SAND CITY ADOPTING AND ADDING CHAPTER 6.10 TO THE SAND CITY MUNICIPAL CODE REQUIRING PROPER DISPOSAL OF PET SOLID WASTE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SAND CITY HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: Chapter 6.10 is hereby added to Title 6 of the Sand City Municipal Code to read in its entirety as follows:

CHAPTER 6.10 PET SOLID WASTE

<u>6.10.010.</u> Purpose: The purpose of this Chapter is to establish requirements for the proper disposal of pet solid waste in the City of Sand City, to protect the public's health, safety and welfare.

<u>6.10.020. Definitions</u>. For purposes of this Chapter, the following term (s) and definitions shall apply:

- A. "Immediate" shall mean that the pet solid waste is removed at once, without delay.
- B. "Owner/Keeper" any person who shall possess, maintain, house or harbor any pet or otherwise have custody of any pet, whether or not the owner of such pet.
- C. "Person" any individual, corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, or political subdivision of this State subject to municipal jurisdiction.
- D. "Pet" a domesticated animal kept for amusement or companionship.
- E. "Pet solid waste" waste matter expelled from the bowels of the pet; excrement.
- F. "Proper disposal" placement in a designated waste receptacle, or other suitable container, and discarded in a refuse container which is regularly emptied by the municipality or some other refuse collector; or disposal into a system designed to convey domestic sewage for proper treatment and disposal.

<u>6.10.030.</u> Requirement for <u>Disposal</u>. All pet owners and keepers are required to immediately and properly dispose of their pet's solid waste deposited on any public property or property of another person.

<u>6.10.040.</u> Exemption. Any owner or keeper who requires the use of a service animal and is physically unable to properly dispose of that service animal's solid waste shall be exempt from the provisions of this Chapter requiring proper disposal of the service animal's solid waste.

<u>6.10.050. Violation and Penalty.</u> Any violation of this section shall constitute an infraction, and may be enforced pursuant to Chapter 1.16 of the Sand City Municipal Code.

SECTION 2: California Environmental Quality Act.

This ordinance would prohibit an activity, and is therefore exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.

SECTION 3: Severance.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional and invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and every section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clause, or phrase be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION 4: Effective Date

This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days following its adoption.
